Diego was born 2 months early and had a pretty rough start in life. He spent about a month in the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit and had multiple surgeries very early on. Due to concerns for his development, he was referred to the VPI Early Intervention Birth to 3 Program at 5 months of age.

Initially, visits focused on coaching Diego's parents in promoting his movement milestones of rolling, sitting, crawling, standing and walking. The more Diego wanted to move, the more evident it became that it was hard for him to do. Together, the family and Early Intervention team worked hard on incorporating motor strategies into their everyday activities that would help encourage him to coordinate his movements so he could reach his toys and move around his home. All that hard work eventually paid off when Diego started to walk at about 16 months old!

Diego's struggles with moving his body continued to affect his development as he got older, specifically with coordinating his mouth and tongue movements so he could learn how to talk. Diego's family and early intervention team used cues that incorporated all his senses to help him learn how to make sounds during his play and daily routines. Once Diego was able to make a variety of sounds, he had to learn how to

put the sounds together to form words. After months of practicing these strategies, Diego finally found his voice and started communicating with words and eventually sentences. Diego recently turned three and was evaluated by the area school district to determine if he qualified for special education services, but his skills fell in the typical range for his age, which thrilled his family.

NAVIGATING EVERY CHALLENGE, together

VPI's Mental Health Navigator received a call from a local Police Department. On the line was an officer, who had the call on speakerphone, and in the room with him was a man named Eric. Eric was experiencing severe depression at the time, and was in tears on the phone with the Navigator. Eric informed the Navigator that he just lost his job, with no money for health insurance to see a doctor. He was so depressed that he was finding it hard to get out of bed, let alone look for work. The Mental Health Navigator reached out to a free clinic in the area and was able to get him an appointment with their psychiatrist. Eric was finally given a formal diagnosis for the mental turmoil he had been experiencing and was prescribed medication to treat his disorder. Eric was able to get a new job and is slowly putting his life back together on the road to recovery.
